

Annual Oxford Uehiro Prize in Practical Ethics: Terms & Conditions

By entering the Annual Oxford Uehiro Centre's Prize in Practical Ethics, you agree to accept the following T&Cs.

Terms of Entry

1. Entry to the Oxford Uehiro Centre's Prize in Practical Ethics is free of charge.
2. Entry is open to all graduate and undergraduate students currently enrolled at the University of Oxford in any subject. Eligibility includes visiting students who are registered as recognized students, and paying fees, but does not include informal visitors
3. All entries must be the original work of the entrant. Software to detect plagiarism will be employed and any essays containing plagiarised material will be disqualified.
4. Essays may cover any topic relevant to practical ethics.
5. The Competition closing date is midnight on Monday 10th February 2020.

The Essay

1. The essay is to be of a maximum of 2000 words
2. Footnotes are NOT included in the word count. However footnotes should be kept to a minimum.
3. Essays will be assessed on the following:
 - 10% on the quality/originality of question posed;
 - 40% originality of argument;
 - 50% quality of the argument.
4. The judging panel will be comprised of researchers from the Oxford Uehiro Centre for Practical Ethics.
5. The judges' decision is final.
6. Finalists will be contacted by the end of February 2020.
7. Finalists may be featured on the Oxford Uehiro Centre's web page, *Practical Ethics in the News* blog, and in the Centre's annual report.

The Presentation

1. The presentation/final will take place on the evening of Tuesday 10th March.
2. All finalists must attend the presentation to be considered.
3. Finalist may have the opportunity to present at The Festival of Practical Ethics, which will take place in Oxford on the 24th March 2020.
4. The Winners of each category will receive a cash prize of £300. The runners up in each category will receive £100.
5. Revised versions of the two winning essays will be considered for publication in the Journal of Practical Ethics, though publication is not guaranteed.
6. The judging panel will be comprised of researchers from the Uehiro Centre for Practical Ethics, along with other notable practitioners in the field of Practical Ethics.
7. The judges' decision is final.
8. Videos and photographs may be taken during the event, for marketing and communications purposes. Images may be used in the Centre's annual report, on the Centre's website, on Social Media and on the *Practical Ethics in the News* blog.
